Speakers



Kirsty Whiten graduated from Edinburgh College of Art in 1999 and spent a year in Paris at La Cite Internationale de Arts. She returned to Edinburgh before settling in Fife in 2010. The core of her practice is drawing and painting, but has also made works in public spaces including murals and paste-ups in urban locations, and collaborated with Edinburgh Printmakers Workshop to create a series of lithographs. She has exhibited regularly in Edinburgh (Edinburgh Printmakers Workshop), Glasgow (Recoat Gallery), London (Stolenspace Gallery) and internationally.

Kirsty strives to make frank images of people, dealing with their psychology and socially constructed behaviour; making the viewer aware

of the sexuality, control and neuroses underneath appearance. She has an ongoing fascination with ritual objects from all world cultures and in her work often returns to anthropology and the study of humans as just another animal.

Jasleen Kaur is a Scottish Indian artist based in London. She is fascinated by the malleability of culture and how social histories become embedded in materials and objects. Her refashioned objects are based on instinct and resourcefulness, reflecting a hybridity of national custom and reconsidering the realities of materiality, usage and everyday routine.

Jasleen is a visiting lecturer at The Royal College of Art and devises workshops and programmes for the Victoria & Albert Museum, Crafts Council, Art on the Underground and Sorrell Foundation. She exhibits worldwide and was awarded the Jerwood Makers Open in 2015. Her work is also part of the permanent collection of the Royal College of Art and Crafts Council.

Alexia Holt has worked at Cove Park since 2004 and produces its international programme of visual arts residencies and commissions. Prior to Cove Park, she was Curator at Tramway, Glasgow. A graduate of Glasgow University's History of Art department, she also worked at Glasgow School of Art and the CCA whilst completing a Ph.D. on early twentieth century fashion design. She is also currently Curator for the Scottish Print Network and has recently developed 'Below another Sky': an international

programme of residencies, exhibitions and events for Scotland's five print studios.

Cove Park is an artist's residency centre located on a 50-acre rural site overlooking Loch Long in Argyll and Bute. Since its launch in 2000, Cove Park has developed significantly, offering a wide range of residencies throughout the year for artists working in all art forms and at all stages in their careers. Sarah Drummond is the co-founder and director of design at CycleHack. Sarah also runs Snook design company and started the Dearest Scotland initiative. CycleHack is a global movement in its third year that has spread to over 70 cities bringing people together to consider how we can reduce the barriers to cycling. CycleHack is on a mission to make the world more sustainable by reducing barriers to cycling. They run an annual event that brings together citizens, local government, cycling agencies and maker communities to break down the problems to cycling where they live and prototype solutions in a 48 hour

event. Dearest Scotland is an apolitical initiative that asked citizens to write a letter to the future of Scotland and culminated in a printed book launched at the Scottish Parliament.

Sarah is the founder and managing director of Snook, a global design firm who work with Government, councils and organisations on a mission to help organisations design and deliver great services and products.

Sarah is a Google Fellow, a member of the Royal Society of Arts and has developed and delivered multiple social innovation projects and services. These include MyPolice, the UK's first online feedback tool for the police, The Matter an educational service teaching young people how to produce newspapers and Dearest Scotland, a nation wide collection of letters published in a book capturing the referendum in 2014.

Matt Baker has concentrated his Artist practice full-time on work in the public domain over the last twenty years. During this time he has developed participatory and collaborative techniques through projects ranging from temporary events/installations to large scale permanent artworks and cultural strategies for programmes of urban change. In 2011 Baker was one of the founder members of the Artist-led Collective 'The Stove Network' in Dumfries.

The Stove Network is a project to embed creativity in the structures that surround us and mobilise citizens as agents of change.

The project is run by a collective of artists and other active citizens in Dumfries and Galloway. The Stove creates participatory public art events to engage the citizens of Dumfries in constructive and practical action in the town. The Stove uses a three storey building in the town centre of Dumfries as an HQ for the project and will operate 100 High Street as a social enterprise. The Stove has a membership of over 240 people ranging from café-owners and wild-food chefs to video artists and DJs.

Bea Last is a D&G based visual artist who's practice is essentially studio based. She creates large scale, contemporary, abstract, paintings that by their very physicality are to be experienced.

Bea's practice focuses on movement, energy, relationship and connection through the medium of paint onto canvas, paper, and sketchbooks. They are about her relationship to and with paint and the dynamics created within.

At present Bea is taking the placement of paintings outwith that of the conventional gallery space and looking towards alternative creative spaces where she can create a dialogue between the structure of a building, its features, various spaces, and highlighted aspects of its architectural design.

Bea has exhibited widely across the U.K, with work held in both the private and corporate sector. Previous clients include Reuters U.K, Logica (Microsoft), Dokkae Project, Saudi, the Corinthia Hotel, London W1 (The British Art Project) Ballymoore properties, Canary Wharf, London and EDL Associates, U.S.A

Frances Priest is an artist and designer based in Edinburgh with a specialism in ceramics. Her work explores pattern and ornament in decorative art and design; where it is found, how it is used and the craft processes involved in its production. From her studio Frances creates intricately decorated ceramic forms, exploring and reinterpreting languages of ornament from different cultures, places and periods in history. Out with the studio Frances enjoys making work in response to people and places, using her interests as a platform from which to develop new work. This approach has led to projects in varied and sometimes unexpected settings, from a Tudor banqueting room in Sheffield, to an underpass in Cumbernauld. Frances' latest work, Patterns of Flora | Mapping Seven Raasay Habitats, is an Atlas Arts commission in collaboration with botanist Stephen Bungard, exploring the diverse natural habitats and plant life on the island of

Raasay. This work is supported by a Creative Scotland Artist Bursary. #patternsofflora

Frances regularly exhibits work in the UK and overseas and her work is represented in a number of UK collections including, the National Museums of Scotland Edinburgh, the Fitzwilliam Museum Cambridge and the Victoria & Albert Museum London. She is currently represented by Tansey Contemporary, Santa Fe.

Samuel Sparrow is the Studio Manager for **MAKLab Dumfries**. He has a background in Interior Design, graduating from Glasgow School of Art in 2006 before working for Habitat and Ikea.

In addition to his role with MAKLab, Samuel is also the owner and Creative Director at SPARROW AND CO. - a British homeware brand that promotes traditional making processes and celebrates the imperfect and inherent beauty that comes with functional, handmade products.



Cat Walker is the Time Banking Development Officer for Third Sector, Dumfries & Galloway which was established alongside 31 other support organisations within Scotland. They work to: Support volunteering and volunteers, develop the third sector, increase social enterprise, build the relationship between the third sector and community planning partners.

For 2 years they have been running the regional time banking project. A time bank is a way for people to share skills and resources and be rewarded for it – in time. For every hour you give, providing a service for another member, you receive one time credit.

You can then exchange your time credits when you need something done e.g. you might want to learn more about woodwork or painting and drawing. Professionals in the creative industries could use the time bank to build up a network of support, for example, there is at least one online music time bank in the UK where musicians share skills with each other.
